Identity Theft and Data Security

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Warning!

Companies and organizations doing business in Texas have **new** duties on top of the duties you already had

The civil penalties can be onerous (\$25,000 per violation in some cases)

The public relations costs can be dear

The injunctive relief can be far worse!


Infiltration

How have the rules changed?

- 23 states have enacted some form of data security legislation
- Some federal legislation already in effect (e.g., HIPPA, GLBA)
- More federal legislation is in the works
- Matters of preemption need to be worked out if/when federal legislation is passed
- In the meantime, state laws are enforceable!

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Example: Texas

- Currently, a hodgepodge of laws, not unlike other states...
- Texas Business & Commerce Code:
- —48.102 Business Duty to Protect Sensitive Personal Info.
- —48.103 Notification Required Following Breach
- —35.48 Retention and Disposal of Business Records
- —35.581 [First] Privacy Policy Needed to Require SSN
- —35.581 [Second] Merchants taking SSN or License Number

Example: Texas

- Texas Business & Commerce Code: (continued)
 - -35.50 Protection of Biometric Data
 - —35.58 Annual disclosure requirement to retain SSN
 - —35.60 Warning signs in restaurants and bars
- —35.61 Business receipts containing credit/debit numbers
- —48.203 Allows DTPA claim for 48.101 violation

Example: Texas

- Laws are not necessarily coherent. No overarching vision
 - —Each provision has specific definitions
- —Who is protected
- —What is protected
- —What penalties are imposed

Federal Preemption

HIPPA, GLBA, FISA, and other laws may preempt the scope of certain state laws

However, state laws may still apply to other aspects of your business operations

Warning

- Laws affecting certain types of data can have far reaching effects on your business operations
- —Employee SSN's
- —Discovery process for law firms
- Employees using Quicken/TurboTax on company machines
- ---Retail transactions

What to do?

Assess whether or not your company obtains implicating information (either accidentally or deliberately)

Create/implement/maintain a security policy if you don't already have one

Create/implement/maintain procedures for tracking implicating information and ensure proper disposal

Don't Panic

Risks can be assessed

Measures can be taken to reduce risk or eliminate potential liability
